#### Revolutionary Period

- Colonial period-none, we were part of the British Empire.
- During the War we were looking for Allies to fight with and support us.
  - The diplomats-Franklin, Adams and Jefferson
  - France- 1778 Franco-American Treaty
  - Spain- Ally of France, also supported our fledgling country.
  - What is owed to our allies after the war?
- Treaty of Paris in 1783



## Federal Period- Isolationism Washington thru Jefferson

- Napoleonic Wars- both sides wanted our support
  - -Washington's 1793 Neutrality Proc
  - -Washington's 1796 Farewell Address
- Jay Treaty- England
- Pinckney Treaty- Spain
- XYZ Affair- France
  - Quasi War
- Further attempts will also be unsuccessful and we will eventually fight the War of 1812.



#### Monroe Doctrine

- In Response to newly independent Latin America.
- Neutrality with Europe, intervention in the Americas.
- Lasting legacy on American Policy



# Pre- Civil War Expansion & Isolationism

- Unless negotiating for additional territories (Manifest Destiny) the U.S. will stay out of foreign affairs.
  - Adams-Onis Treaty
  - -Texas
  - -Oregon
  - -Ostend Manifesto
  - -Mexican American War
  - -Gadsen Purchase



### Civil War Isolationism

- Southern overtures towards England
  - -Trent Affair 1861
  - -Blockade runners vs. battle ships
- The Emancipation Proclamation and the Battle of Antietam will decide the British against supporting the Confederacy.



## Gilded Era Asia- Open Door

- Admiral Matthew Perry and Japan, 1853
- Annexation of Hawai'i, 1898
- John Hay and China, 1899-1900
  - -Boxer Rebellion



## Spanish American War Intervention

- Intervene to help oppressed peoples (Cuba)
- Disastrous long term consequences
  - -Cuba Freed
  - -Gained Guam and Puerto Rico
  - -Philippine Insurrection



#### Progressive Foreign Policy

- Teddy Roosevelt- Big Stick/Roosevelt Corollary
  - Panama Canal
- Taft- Dollar Diplomacy
- Wilson- Moral Diplomacy
  - Mexican Revolution
  - -WW1
  - 14 Points/League of Nations
  - Rejection of Treaty of Versailles
- FDR- Good Neighbor Policy

- Neutrality Acts of 1935, 1936, 1937
  - -No involvement
- Appeasement of Japan
- Neutrality Act of 1939
  - -Cash and Carry
- Destroyer Deal, 1940
- Lend Lease Act, 1941
- America First Committee



## Cold War Containment

- George Kennan's Containment
  - Truman Doctrine
  - Marshall Plan
  - NATO
- Kennedy's Flexible Response
  - Cuba, Vietnam, small troop incursions
  - -Johnson and escalation
- Nixon's Détente
  - Vietnamization
  - Beijing and Moscow
- Reagan Doctrine
  - Rollback Communism and Arms Race
